

The monthly raffle saw Don Jennings winning a wildflower etched two-part relish.



The next meeting will be at Betty and Tony Regan's home, Sat., October 20th.




THANKSGIVING TURKEY

More on the "Turkey Bird"! While in Ohio in July, I regretfully had to tell a friend that we have no evidence that the Cambridge Glass Company made the clear Turkey she had purchased as "Cambridge". Most of you are probably familiar with the turkey she had purchased. It is about half the size of the Cambridge #1222 Turkey, and was probably made by the Smith Glass Company.


There have been several articles in the CRYSTAL BALL showing us ways to identify the real Cambridge Turkey. I would like to call your attention to these articles once again, and urge you to study them before buying! These articles appeared in the following issues: Issue #10-February, 1974 by Charles Upton; Issue #38-June, 1976 by Jack & Sue Rettig; Issue #44-December, 1976 by Dave Rankin; and you will also find a very good picture in the 1930-34 Catalog Reprint on page J.

I will attempt to add to the information in these articles by sharing the photos shown on this page, of our #1222 Turkey. It is crystal with the Charleton type decoration. I have seen these turkeys in amber, royal blue and blue bell colors, but this is the first one in crystal. The decoration contains berries and leaves. We are still debating whether they are strawberries or raspberries! The berries are almost a white to a deep purple and the leaves are white to green in shading. Much bright gold is used and the head and feet show much detail. The head and feet are painted purple, with gold eyes, beak and toenails.





The front of the tail has two rows of 17 feathers each, with spine center. The back of the tail is smooth with no detail. The rump between the wings has several rows of feathers with a row of leaves and grass under the last row of feathers. The breast has nine rows of feathers. The top of the tail, center to breast, center measures 9". The overall height is 8", and the base is an oval 5-11/16" x 4-3/4". The lid measures 6½" (from center back to front) including ½" end where it extends past the rim that fits inside the base. The second row of feathers at the breast center has a center feather extending the length of three rows of feathers, with several lines running the entire length of this feather. The underside of the base has a rough, rippled texture. It IS NOT crosshatched!



I hope this helps put the right bird on your Thanksgiving table!

PROJECT

In view of the fact that our recent attempt at establishing a Museum failed, it looks like we will need to regroup and do some additional planning. Our failure was due in part, to our lack of funds, our lack of time needed for proper planning, and to the inadequate response of the pledges. However, we must continue our fund raising efforts for our Museum, and your Project Committee has dedicated themselves to this end.

Right now we have nothing definite on any of the Projects we have explored. It has been decided that we will continue the Bookend Project. We have tried, in the past, to have a mold made to continue this Project, but we have met with failure. At the present time we are in contact with Lucile Kennedy of Lenox-Imperial Glass Company, and she has shown a willingness to help us get a Bookend produced, hopefully the Lion. The problem at present is the fact that the Lenox-Imperial Glass Company is on strike. Hopefully they will be back soon and then we will be able to pursue this further and come up with this second Bookend. Although it may be a little premature, keep in mind that there will only be a limited number of these produced. You will want to own one, not only because it will surely appreciate in value, but because all of the profit will go toward the Museum.

Another Project we are considering is to have some type of binder made up for your issues of the CRYSTAL BALL. We may have something more on this at the November Quarterly Meeting.

While we are on the subject of the November meeting, we would like to suggest that if anyone has a piece of Cambridge Glass they would be willing to bring and donate, we will hold a little Auction and turn it into money for the Museum Fund. It doesn't have to be anything of great value, just something that we can auction off, have a little fun, and make a buck for the Museum Fund!

Although this is not part of the Project Committees assignment, we would like to say something about the Annual Auction. Again Lynn Welker is in charge and we don't know how he can possibly do an encore to last year's Auction, but we're sure he's planning to better last year's performance. He will need your help in getting the consignments in early, and again, if you have anything you would like to donate (rather than consign), let him know and he will have it in the Auction. In the past some people have donated things strictly for the Museum Fund, and we would hope that they, and others, will see fit to do so this year.

As with any organization of this type, people probably get tired of hearing money, money, money, but there really isn't any alternative. We need money to operate and to establish our Museum. We will endeavor to keep the Projects going so that you will receive value for your money, and will be helping the Museum Fund at the same time.

The Museum Fund could use any donations you would like to make in the form of cash, checks, or money orders. "Hell, find some excuse to send a buck or two!" For instance, if John is going to go out on Friday night and play cards with the boys and have a few drinks, say "I'm going to send \$10 to the Museum Fund if you're going to do that!". John, you tell Ann "If you're going to spend \$75 for a new dress, I'm going to send a few bucks to the Museum Fund, because they could use it better!". Maybe we could screen the excuses and award a prize at the Annual Convention for the best excuse!

Here's hoping that we can raise a bunch of money this year and also give the members what they deserve: THE MOST FANTASTIC MUSEUM POSSIBLE!



This is a 164 page reprint of the original catalog and it is available in paperback only, at a cost of \$6.95 plus \$1.00 for handling and postage.


