INTRODUCES THE MUSEUM

Convention 1982 is history. Of course this article has to be written well before the Convention begins. For those of you who are unable to attend, next month's *Crystal Ball* will bring you all of the activity reports.

As I write this, the final hectic countdown for the Convention and Show has begun. All of the little last minute arrangements have to be made, compounded this year by preparations for the MUSEUM opening. We have gotten a little behind schedule on the MUSEUM. This is not due to the lack of enthusiasm on the part of the small group of members who have spent practically all of their spare time, especially in the last two months, at the MUSEUM site. We knew what we wanted to do, but I guess we didn't realize just how much work was involved. Of course, we made numerous changes that weren't in the original plans so that we could present a MUSEUM that would be as attractive as possible with the limited funds we had available.

Two of the improvements that we made and had to contract out, since we didn't have available volunteers to do the work, were the facing of the front of the building and the cutting of the glass for the showcase shelves and doors. These two jobs ran a little behind schedule and caused some nervous moments, because we had to hold up certain improvements until they were finished. Any way, these obstacles have been overcome and we will have just about everything ready as planned.

Although the MUSEUM will be opened, there are quite a few improvements to be made that, at the present time, are being held up for lack of funds. We have more landscaping to do, some minor improvements to the exterior of the building, finishing of a storage area inside the building, installation of track lighting and numerous other little things that take time and money.

We have had several members, during the last year, donate money to help with the improvements already made, and we hope that members will continue to be so generous so that we may continue with our effort.

Of course the Grand Opening will have taken place June 25th. We are planning to have the MUSEUM open ten months a year, closed in December and January. The MUSEUM hours will be 1:00 to 5:00 PM Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM on Saturdays and Sundays. Admission will be \$1.25, \$1.00 for members, 75¢ for children under the age of twelve and \$1.00 per person for groups of 25 or more. The MUSEUM will be staffed by volunteers consisting of the Board of Directors on weekends. We will need to hire someone to keep the MUSEUM open during the week. With this plus the utilities, insurance, general upkeep and miscellaneous expenses we will have an operating expense of about \$500 per month. We will need your support in meeting this obligation also.

We are happy that we are able to provide you with a MUSEUM, so that you may enjoy and study the nearly 2,000 pieces of Cambridge Glass that will be assembled. Please use the MUSEUM and support it.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article is the first of a series of articles by Mark Nye dealing with the "Cambridge Girls", ie those etchings bearing girls' names. Thank you, Mark, for helping us become better acquainted with our "lovely Cambridge Girls"

GLORIA

Gloria or plate etching #746 was first shown in a Cambridge Glass Co. catalog supplement issued during late summer or early fall of 1930. The October 1930 issue of "China, Glass & Lamps" carried an ad for the pattern with the caption "NEW". The same trade journal also published ads for Gloria in the February and November 1931 issues. The pattern was discontinued prior to 1940 since the Cambridge catalog issued in January of that year did not list Gloria in the etching index.

Gloria was primarily used on the 3400 line. The Cambridge catalog supplements issued from 1930 to 1934 show the Gloria etching on at least 79 different 3400 line items plus 15 miscellaneous pieces, mostly vases (8) and tumblers (3). In addition to the 3400 line dinnerware, there are at least six stemware lines etched with Gloria including the famed Cambridge nudes. However, nudes found with the Gloria etching would be considered exceptional and rare items. In addition to the nudes or #3011 stemware, other stemware lines used were 3035, 3120, 3130, 3135 and 3025.

Colors and color combinations on which Gloria may be found are Gold Krystol, Gold Krystol and Amber, Heatherbloom, Crystal, Peach-blo, Amber, Amethyst, Emerald (light), Emerald (dark) and Willow Blue. It should be noted that these are not listed in the order of frequency found. I would venture to say that Gold Krystol, Crystal, Peach-blo and Emerald (light) are the least difficult colors to find with the Gloria etching. Gold encrusted pieces were also produced in color and Crystal and there is a possibility of finding the etching on colors other than those listed here.

Gloria on Heatherbloom #3035 goblets, tall sherbets and cocktails are known as well as 3400/54 cups and saucers and 3400/62 salad plates. Cups and saucers (3400/54) are known to exist in Willow Blue.


The Gloria pattern was also done in silver on ebony ware and in these cases, designated as Decorate D/971-S. Use of the pattern in this manner appears to have been limited to occasional and accessory pieces, such as console sets, vases, pitchers and plates.


Based on the number of catalog pages and the wide range of dinnerware, stemware and accessory items shown, Cambridge obviously intended for Gloria to be a major line. Its absence today indicates it never achieved that status. This pattern may be found, but not with the frequency one would expect from viewing the catalog pages. Why it never became a big seller remains a mystery to me; and if it did become a success, where is the glass?












3400 Dinnerware Plate Etched 746 "Gloria"

Also, a Lily of the Valley gold etched wine, a Diane amber bowl with crystal stem, and a Chantilly wine and cordial. There were cordials in Daffodil, Wildflower and Rosepoint, plus other pieces.

Show & Tell items included a Valencia plate, a mocha flower holder with oval base, a Dresden creamer, a pink vase with a Rose etching, a Blenko Glass water pitcher, a jadite butter dish, and a green bird flower frog which has been claimed to be Cambridge but is unverified.
