The Lure of Glass – Still Strong at This Year's Auction

It has been a tough year this past year, both economically as well as weather related in many parts of the country, so when a bit of warm weather came upon us, and the call of spring began to lure people out of their homes to soak up a little sunshine with a dab of hope for brighter days, the call of Cambridge glass also had the power to lure people from every corner of the country to attend this year's National Cambridge Collector's 2009 Benefit Auction. It did not matter if you wanted to go home with multiple boxes of glass, or if you just wanted to spend some time renewing friendships and relaxing with people who love the same things you do, everyone who attended was well rewarded. It was a packed room at the Pritchard Laughlin center with 110 admissions plus many volunteers. And once again, sincere thanks go out to our wonderful auctioneer, Craig Connelly and his superb staff, who add so much to the annual gathering. There were many first time attendees, as well as those who come every year, and the fabulous array of 401 items had something for everyone.

So many Colors were well represented this year. A few highlights included a #72 Topaz Round base 7" Candlestick pair that went for \$165; a #1528 Mandarin Gold 10 1/4" Bud Vase with "Regal Lion" Etch for \$450; a #3400/1240 Amber Oval Bowl with Gold Encrusted Wildflower for \$500: a Rubina 11" wide optic Bowl for \$210; a #1528 Pistachio Crackle 10 1/2" Bud Vase for \$260; a #37 Heatherbloom Mt. Vernon Cake plate for \$70; a #299 Peachblo Candy box and cover with Lt

Emerald Rose Knob for \$95; a Lt Emerald 10 1/2" Style 1 Swan for \$325; an SS#46 Royal Blue 7 1/2" Shell Flower Holder for \$450; Two #2355 Moonlight Blue 8" Epergne Vases with Matching 12" Vase Arm for \$475; and a pair of #437 Ritz Blue 9 1/2" Candlesticks with Gold Encrusted #708 for \$300, just to name a few.

For the new collector, there were many reasonably priced items with which to start a collection, such as a Gold Krystol Tall Sherbet with Gloria etch for \$25, a #3575 Mocha Stradivari 1-oz Cordial for \$35, or a Crystal Pristine Ice Tub with a Silver Lotus Decoration for \$15. And for those seeking the very rare, there were things like the #7A Mardi Gras 7" Vase with label which sold for \$1,400.

For Nude collectors, a wide variety of Nudes included such wonderful items as a rare Forest Green 7" Cupped Comport etched Gloria for \$1,300; a Windsor Blue 7" Seashell Comport for \$600; a Frosted 11-oz Table Goblet with Rockwell Sterling Overlay design for \$525; a Crystal 7" Cupped Comport with AppleBlossom etch for \$450: and two Carmen 3-oz Cocktails for \$230. There were also multiple Flying Lady Bowls (how unusual is

that?) including one in Crystal for \$350; Crystal Satin for \$250; Crown Tuscan for \$225; and Carmen for \$1,600.

Opaques again stood out this year. A wide array of Crown Tuscan items included a #1066 Crown Tuscan Comport with rare Ebony Foot for \$500. A few of the other wonderful opaques included a Windsor Blue Daisy and Button Hat for \$145; an Azurite Perfume Lamp with two differently shaped globes for \$120; a Milkglass Dresden Lady Figure for \$110; an Ebony 7" Sweet Pea Vase with Silver Overlay Oriental Scene for \$215; and, a true rarity - the SS#7 Experimental color Dark Blue Opaque 9" three footed Seashell Bowl which sold for \$1,400.

The large variety of gold, silver and enamel decorations were also outstanding this year and a few of those highlights not already mentioned as part of other categories were the #693/3000 Canape Set with Red Enamel

> Polo Scene for \$145; the #3400/92 Crystal 32 oz Ball Jug Decanter with Gold Encrusted Rosepoint for \$375; a #1070 Ebony 36-oz Pinch Decanter with White Gold Encrusted Apple Blossom for \$255; a Crown Tuscan 9" Comport with Charleton decorated Harbor and Roses for \$40; a #168 Azurite Sandwich Tray with Black Enamel encrusted #528 "Egypt" for \$85; a Ritz Blue Decagon Bowl with heavy Floral Silver Overlay for \$85; and a P418 Pristine 5 part Relish with Rockwell Sterling Floral Decoration for \$40.

The Gross Receipts for this year's auction were \$41,210, actually a bit higher than last year. The gross to our club was \$9,250 before expenses, thus marking a very successful year even in tough economic times!

I once again want to offer a HUGE "Thank-you" to the Auction Committee, and especially Squeek and Dorothy Rieker, Lynn Welker and each and every one of the volunteers who work so very hard to make the auction such a wonderful success for our organization! We just do not realize how much time and energy goes into this effort, which is so important in helping and sustaining the organization that we love. And another HUGE "Thank-you" goes to each of the glass consignors, without whom the auction would not be possible.

So, if you have thought you may have heard the "Lure of the Glass" calling to you, but you have not yet attended one of the auctions, when spring is in the air next year, make a point to be in Cambridge the first weekend in March. For the fun, the friendships and the wonderful glass, you will never regret it!

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ONLY QUESTIONS - NO ANSWERS

Many of us have heard that "Hind Sight is 20/20"? You are probably asking yourself what does this have to do with Cambridge glass? Since we recently published a photo in the Crystal Ball of a Near Cut lamp and that identification was based on a 30 year old mistake; it is time to fix the error.

Several problems started early in the clubs existence. One of our early board members was Jabe Tarter, a newspaper columnist from the Akron Beacon Journal. He wrote about antiques with a special interest in glass (Cambridge glass). He wrote a column in the Crystal Ball starting with the first issue. In that issue, he put the name "Royal Crown Tuscan" to Crown Tuscan. This isn't really a problem but in the next issue he wrote about a Tomato compote with a cover that was marked with a C within a triangle. We now know this to be a covered comport made by the Co-Operative Flint Glass Company from Beaver Falls, Pa, and it is called Sunset.

In 1970 Harold and Judy Bennett published the first color book on Cambridge Glass. For the first time we had a book to show us the different colors that Cambridge produced. I know I tried to get a piece of each color listed on page 13 and 14. As years passed, we have identified several mistakes in this book. Again, please understand that we aren't finding fault with the book; it was a great book for its time but we need to correct some of the errors.

On page 17, plate #1, fourth item on the top shelf, not Cambridge. **On page 19**, plate #3, third item on the second shelf, not Cambridge. **On page 33**, plate #17, third item on the second shelf, not Cambridge. **On page 37**, plate #21, third item on the second shelf, not Cambridge. On page 38, plate #22, third item on the first shelf, not Cambridge. On page 39, plate #23, third item on the first shelf, not Cambridge. **On page 40**, plate #24, third item on the first shelf, not Cambridge. On page 40, plate #24, second row is called "Sponged acid finish" this decoration is really what is called "glue chip" Where a coat of animal hide glue is put on an item and as it dries, it pulls off small pieces of glass and gives the rough texture on the glass. On page 41, plate #25, the complete second shelf. This is called "sunset" from Co-Operative Flint glass company of Beaver Falls, Pa. On page 45, plate #29, first item on the second shelf, not Cambridge. **On page 46**, plate #30, fourth item on the first shelf, not Cambridge. On page 46, plate #30, first item on the third shelf, not Cambridge. On page 47, plate #31, fifth item on the first shelf, not Cambridge. **On page 47**, plate #31, eight item on the second shelf, not Cambridge. **On page 56**, plate #40, third item on the third shelf, not Cambridge. On page 57, plate #41, first item on the third shelf, the flower frog is called a penguin but is identified in the 1929 catalogue as an "Eagle". On page 62, plate #45, second item on the third shelf, not Cambridge. On page 65, plate #48, seventh item on the forth shelf, not Cambridge. **On page 67**, plate #50, second item on the second shelf, not Cambridge. On page 74, plate #56, third item on the first shelf, not Cambridge.

The book "Cambridge Ohio Glass in Color" by Mary, Lyle and Lynn Welker had a 1969 copyright but came out just after the Bennett's book. Again this book opened many eyes to the beauty of Cambridge Glass but it also had a few mistakes.

Plate 4, row 5, item #4, not Cambridge. Plate 8, row 3, item #4, not Cambridge. Plate 8, row 4, item #1, not Cambridge. Plate 8, row 4, item #2, not Cambridge. Plate 9, row 1, item #1, not Cambridge. Plate 9, row 2, item #3, not Cambridge. Plate 11, row 1, item #4, not Cambridge. Plate 11, row 4, item #2, 3, 4, not Cambridge. Plate 15, row 1, item #2, not Cambridge.

The Walkers' did a follow-up color book in 1973 with only one noted mistake.

Plate 10, row 3, item #2, not Cambridge.

If Cambridge mistakes are found in other publications, please drop me a note and we will try to correct them or at least make all NCC members aware of them.

It is preferable for your photos to be a minimum of 300 psi. Photoshop is great software, but the better your photo, the better the final result.


#46 low footed; #1621 Urn Vase gold encrusted Blossomtime and a bowl and candlesticks with an early etch called Blackberry.

Dear Friends:

The Board of Directors is responsible for making an action plan of what activities NCC will undertake during an upcoming calendar year. In order to come up with that plan, we discuss what's working, what isn't, what would we like to do new, what do we want to quit, but most of all – what can we do to make NCC a better organization. Once we have an action plan, we convert it to dollars. The monetized action plan is the budget.

The budget for 2009 takes NCC into open waters. This is the first budget year since we acquired the museum, which does not have any financial commitments for debt or major required expenditures. To the credit of the Board, I think we have wisely chosen how to deal with our new freedom. There are two major objectives in the 2009 Budget. The first is the planned acquisition of important Cambridge Glass Company historical records which have become available to us. The second objective is the infusion of operating funds into the endowment. The budget reflects the planned accomplishment of these objectives.

The two most significant operating changes undertaken in the recent past have been; 1) the successful change from a dues based operation to a Friend supported organization and; 2) the investment in the Crystal Ball. Both these changes are nearing transitional completion. The Annual Fund is going into its fourth year and has established an operational consistency. One additional change to the Annual Fund will become effective in 2009. The Patron levels have been combined with a base level of \$35 effective in 2009. This change has been included as budget neutral. The change in Crystal Ball operations is now fully integrated into the budget.

The biggest sensitivity in the 2009 Budget is any impact from the recent economic downturn on gifts to the organization. I am hopeful our base will not be greatly impacted. Another issue which bears watching in the 2009 budget is revenue from merchandise, publications, and events. Revenue has been dropping over the previous years and associated operations need to receive our attention to be sure results are consistent with our plans.

NCC as an organization has always been striving to get to a higher level. We started in the early 1970's as a local group of individuals who banded together to appreciate their common interest in collecting Cambridge Glass. From those discussions came the formation of NCC and the publication of the first Crystal Ball in 1973. In 1982 the first museum opened. In 2002 the South 9th Street museum opened. In 2006 we purchased the last of the molds. No more debt in 2008. All of which brings us to the 2009 Budget. I am excited we have the opportunity to start NCC into the future through planning. Our plans will bring long-term financial stability to NCC, improve our operational efficiency, and make better Friends of all of us.

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




