- You will get an email confirmation of your registration and what meals you have selected
- Your registration will be accurate

Director who then must re-input all the data. In the future, it will be all one link and one database

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

2016 Annual Fund

The March Benefit Auction continues to provide Cambridge glass collectors an exciting and comfortable setting in which to purchase many high quality pieces of Cambridge glass. In addition to the 125-150 collectors who attended this year's auction, the auction committee received many absentee bids from collectors who were unable to attend. Floor sales totaled \$50,540 with NCC receiving \$14,528 in commissions and sales from club owned glass. Some of the highlights from the auction included an Ebony gold encrusted Rose Point comport (\$2,500), a brown enameled monkey lamp (\$2,300), a Carmen ball jug with silver overlay (\$2,000), and a Royal Blue nude banquet goblet (\$1,400). Thank you to the auction committee, glass consignors, and bidders (floor and absentee) for making the year's auction a great success.

The Annual Fund materials and election ballots will be mailed around first week of April. The Annual Fund represents NCC's yearly capital campaign which permits us to maintain the National Museum of Cambridge Glass, publish and distribute a quality newsletter, purchase glassware and related materials for the museum collection, and continue to grow our Endowment Fund. Your participation in the Annual Fund is crucial for the success of our club. As you consider your financial commitment to NCC this year, I ask you to reflect on the enjoyment you receive from collecting Cambridge glass and the many strong and lasting friendships you have created as a result of your affiliation with NCC.

Members of the board of directors serve four-year terms. This year, the terms of Cindy Arent, Larry Everett, and Mark Nye are ending. Cindy and Larry are planning to run for re-election. After serving on the board of directors for many years, Mark Nye has decided not to run, but he will continue his role as NCC's Archivist. With Larry Everett being our new VP of Education, I am certain that Mark and Larry will be working together on new educational initiatives. In addition to Cindy and Larry, members Sandy Bridwell-Walker, Bill Dufft, and Sharon Miller have volunteered to run for the board of directors. Biographies of each candidate will be included in the Annual Fund mailing. Please return you Annual Fund commitment and election ballots as soon as possible. Ballots must be received prior to Annual Convention in June.

During the third weekend of February, I attended the Houston Glass Show hosted by NCC member and glass dealer, Max Miller. The Houston Glass Show opens on Friday evening and provides collectors a relaxed environment to make purchases and reconnect with fellow glass collectors. I enjoyed visiting with NCC members Max Miller, Kathleen Klaviter, Scott & Gwenell Pierce, and Freeman & Jeannie Moore. Glass dealers from around the country displayed their finest pieces of elegant and depression glassware. Some of the most interesting piece of Cambridge glass included, a #225 Pristine 9.5" 2-part bowl etched Rose Point, a 3400/119 32oz ball decanter and tumblers etched Rose Point, a very rare #89 28 oz square decanter gold encrusted Rose Point, an unusual #478 cupped Caprice punch bowl, a #179 La Rosa Caprice 32oz juice pitcher, a #28 14" Topaz Caprice torte plate, a 3400/9 7" Willow Blue candy box and cover gold encrusted Apple Blossom, a #101 Pristine cocktail shaker RC Achilles, and a #110 4-pint water pitcher etched Marjorie.

Annual convention is quickly approaching. The convention committee, led by Rick Jones, is continuing to finalize meals, educational programs, and other convention details. If you have never attended annual convention or have not attended in many years, I encourage you to mark your calendars for June 23-25. This year's theme is Hollywood. We need YOU to make the dream continue!





NMCG..... Almost Ready for 2016 Season!

As I write this museum update, we have just two weeks before the National Museum of Cambridge Glass (NMCG) opens on April 1st for the new season. We will be having our annual museum staff meeting on March 14 and the carpet will be cleaned on March 18. All security and silent alarms will be checked by Marathon Alarms and Mark Nye is working on the 2016 Museum Tour Guide.

We also are in the process of finishing up a grant from the Cambridge Kiwanis Foundation that was announced at convention last year. The mission of the Kiwanis Foundation is to promote youth, quality of life, education, family values and the Cambridge area. Due to the grant, NCC was able to update the area of the museum where people search for information about family members or friends that worked at the Cambridge Glass Company. A TV/DVD was purchased for the room that can be used as a non-stop visual of

archival records not available to the public on a daily basis. New chairs and training tables were also added to support the weight of the etching plates. A new student activity book was developed, "THE HEAT IS ON" and printed as a result of the Kiwanis Grant. All children that visit the museum will receive one free of charge thanks to the Cambridge Kiwanis Foundation.

February 17th was a very good day for NCC. We received an email from Debbie Robinson, Executive Director of the Cambridge/Guernsey County Visitors & Convention Bureau that we had received a \$4,220 Grant Assistance Program award from a grant submitted by Cindy Arent. These funds are to be used for advertising and marketing for the museum, convention/glass show

and a website redesign and enable NCC to do promotion that we would otherwise not be able to afford. More information will follow.

Twelve motorcoach groups have already booked for 2016. There are now four different tour options offered to bus companies. We have Cambridge Etiquette, Hollywood, Meet the Glassworkers and Marbles. Two groups have already booked tours with an emphasis on marbles. The Christensen Agate Company was located behind the Cambridge Glass Company and used Cambridge cullet in the manufacturing of their marbles. There is a collection of Christensen marbles on display at the museum that showcases the beautiful opaque

Cambridge Glass Company colors. We also wanted to offer tour groups the opportunity to actually play marbles without asking them to get down on the floor. The Kiwanis Grant provided the funds to enable us to create equipment that can be set up and taken down easily for each adult or student group the choose the marble tour option.

Auction weekend was a good time for all at the museum. We greeted several members and also had many new and interested visitors. Three sisters from Pennsylvania had read about the auction and planned a sister's getaway weekend to Cambridge. They really enjoyed the museum on Friday, came to the auction on Saturday and learned a lot about Cambridge Glass. Thank you to everyone for your glass donations!

It was good to see so many members during the auction weekend and we hope to greet even more of you during convention and throughout the year!

OTHER CONVENTION NEWS

We are putting final touches on what we think will be think will be a highly interactive program that will give NCC members a better understanding and appreciation for how a Museum Bus Tour works. This is a major part of our Outreach and Education Mission and is led by many mostly local superstars in our NCC family. We now have dozens of bus tours a year that strongly support NCC through admission and gift shop revenue as well as positive word-of-mouth and Trip Advisor reviews.

The first fifty or so who register for this free activity, **The Backlot Tour**, will assemble in bus-like positions on the Museum's front side walk and will be led inside to experience how a real tour operates. Believe me, this will be VERY enlightening. Given our Museum capacity, we will need limit the actual participants. If we get overwhelming interest, we will consider a lottery selection method if necessary, but we won't know that for a month or two.

Ever dream of being in a Reality Show? Well this could be your lucky year. Upon the conclusion of the Backlot Tour, we will hold an Open Casting Call for Conventioneers who would like to be a Tour Guide in an **ACTUAL BUS TOUR ON SATURDAY.** You will be asked to talk for 30-60 seconds about why you would be an excellent tour guide. Our selection committee will deliberate after all presentations and announce which 2-3 members have been selected to be actual guides. These selections will be announced at dinner on either Thursday or Friday night.

One caveat, bus groups sometimes cancel. Hopefully the one scheduled Saturday afternoon does not, but at least we will have 2-3 more highly-trained guides for future use!

Welcome to the eBay Report. This column features Cambridge glass items that sold on eBay circa late February through mid-March, 2016. Selling prices have been rounded to the nearest dollar. Here we go:

Statuesque (Nude Stem) Line

A brandy with scarce amber bowl sold for \$39. A set of 4 clarets with Royal Blue bowls sold for \$255.

Cigarette boxes were well-represented on eBay during this period. One featuring a seldom-seen satinized nude sold for \$280. A cigarette box in solid Crown Tuscan sold for the opening bid of \$445. The same seller also offered one with Royal Blue top, and it, too, sold for \$445. All of these cigarette boxes were complete with lid.



A comport with Seashell top in Windsor Blue sold for \$265. Two pairs of candleholders in Crown Tuscan were offered recently. One pair sold for \$280, while the other pair brought \$251, both in auction format.



Animals and Figural items

A small covered bunny box in crystal with no fur detail

hopped to a new home for \$195 on a Buy It Now. A 16 inch Swan bowl in crystal (incorrectly identified as the punch bowl) with handpainted enameled floral decoration (probably Charleton) sold for \$477 after a flurry of bid



sold for \$477, after a flurry of bidding.

A #40 10 inch Flower or Fruit Center (better known as



the "Flying Nude" footed bowl) in Windsor Blue sold on Buy It Now for \$1,850. One in Amethyst sold at auction for \$1,275. Another one in Amethyst brought only \$461 due to a chip on the back and some roughness on the rim. This report is provided to keep members up with what's happening on the world's largest Internet Auction site, and focuses on Cambridge glass items that are seldom or rarely seen. Please note we cannot guarantee the accuracy of listings herein.

A "Two Kids" figural flower frog in Dianthus Pink was offered at a jaw-dropping \$696, and sold for an undisclosed Best Offer price. Apparently this one is hard to find in that color and with an oval base.

Etched Tableware and Stemware

A #3900/114 or P-100 32 ounce martini jug etched Wildflower sold for the opening bid of \$60. The identical item, etched Chantilly, sold for \$68. A #1400/100 goblet with amber bowl and crystal stem,



etched Elaine, sold for a surprisingly low bid of \$27.

February and early March were great months for sales of Rose Point etched items. Here are some of the highlights:

A#1402/28 Tally Ho 18 inch "Sunday Night Supper" plate etched Rose Point sold for the opening bid of \$120. A very



hard to find #944 cream & sugar set, etched Rose Point, brought \$285 in spirited competitive bidding.

The most outstanding Rose Point

item that sold this month (my opinion) was the #1533 blown cover paired with a sterling silver plate to create a butter or cheese dish. It sold for \$325 on a Buy It Now, and I think it was worth every penny.



Enamel and Gold Decorations

A lucky bidder scotched his or her competition, winning a set of 4 #1402/35 Tally Ho mugs with Three Canny Scots decoration for a high bid of \$203. There was some fading and wear to the decoration on some of the mugs. The same seller also offered what I believe was a #9403

12 ounce tumbler, also with Three Canny Scots decoration, which sold for \$90. The enamel was in better condition than the mugs, but some tiny rim nicks were noted.



Another deep-pockets bidder ponied up \$885 for #1321 footed decanter with #938 Polo decoration in red enamel.

A #3400/120 cocktail shaker in Crystal with #4 chrome top and gold encrusted



Diane shook things up for \$690. A #1066 footed cigarette holder with gold encrusted Diane



etching sold for \$77 on a Buy It Now.

Vases

A pair of Special Article #92 12 inch "stick" vases in Ebony with an etched and gold encrusted band at the top sold for \$32. A Caprice #250 3-1/2 inch vase in Moonlight Blue sold for \$40. A #94-1/2 sweet pea vase in Rubina, 4-3/4 inches high and 7 inches across, sold for \$76.

Miscellaneous

A set of 4 #3300 Moderne line tall sherbets in Willow Blue sold for the opening bid of \$50.



Caprice stemware in Pistachio continues to amaze. A pair of #300 9 ounce goblets with crystal foot and stem sold for \$300 on Buy It Now. Someone must be trying to put together

a set of it – or maybe *several* someones are competing to do the same thing.

A tall samovar in Bluebell with Grape



etching sold for \$260. A nearly identical samovar in the same color but with Paden City's Vintager etching sold for \$180. It is my understanding these were private molds that traveled to whatever company agreed to produce them.

A #340/156 12

ounce decanter and two #5460 cordials in Milk glass set in Farber Brothers brass holders sold for \$81.

A single #2800/235 Community

7-1/2 inch candleholder in Ebony with the E510 etching on the shaft was offered incognito, and sold for the opening bid of \$17. I wonder whether one of "us" sniffed it out, or whether it went to a happy, but clueless, new home.

A prism-shaped advertising sign in Ebony with Cambridge Glass etched and gold encrusted on the face failed to sell for the opening bid of \$50, likely due to it having several chips on the corners.



I was surprised to see a #489 4-piece boudoir set comprised of a Royal Blue pitcher with crystal lid (this is the lid with the "ring" finial) and matching Royal Blue tumbler, set on the usual oval, tab-handled tray in crystal. Apparently I wasn't the only person who hadn't seen a

set like this before, because it sold on Buy It Now for a hefty \$295. The set is shown on page 31-17 of the Cambridge Glass 1930-1934 catalog reprint.





Blue Caprice #178 90 ounce Doulton jug sold for an amazing \$2,800.

An odd Cambridge Arms piece turned up. It was the common 3-way arm, but

instead of a candle socket in the center, it had an acorn-like

finial. It sold for \$98 after spirited bidding. I had never seen one like this before, but apparently it is an old style. It was mentioned in the minutes of the November 2008 program as printed in the January 2009 Crystal Ball.



Speaking of answers, longtime NCC members Bud and Anna Walker emailed to tell me that the green twine holder I reported on in last month's column can be seen in Cambridge Catalog #11 of Chemical, Laboratory Supply, Physician, Druggists, Photographers and Watchmakers Glassware. It is depicted on page 65, and described as "Twine Holder Metal screw bottom. Furnished crystal, blue, amber." Now we can add green to the list. Thanks, Bud and Anna.

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
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Friends of Cambridge – Annual Fund
