Thoughts from the President - - - -

You have just returned home from a visit with friends on a Sunday afternoon. As you walk into your home, an eerie feeling comes over you that something is wrong. After a few seconds of uncertainty, it dawns upon you that something is absent. First you notice that a particular space is empty, and then, it seems like all at once, you realize that many many things are missing. Then you finally realize that you have been robbed. Your Cambridge glass is all gone and along with it several other collectables and antiques.

As soon as the initial shock wears off you call the police, and the problems start to become apparent.

With the first form that the police start to fill out come the questions. What all is missing? What is the value? Can you identify the items? Are you insured? Who would want such items? Where could they be sold or gotten rid of easily?

Hopefully, you are among the very few that maintain an inventory of each item in your collection. Possibly, you also have cur-

rent values listed, and if you are really "on the ball", you have photos that show all or nearly all of the items that are of value to you and hard to describe.

We, of course, hope that none of you ever experience a situation such as the foregoing, but we do hope that it will serve to trigger some thinking on your part.

As we add to our collections on a day by day basis we may neglect to either create an inventory list, or to up-date an existing one. We also seem to neglect the aspect of the increase in value. Many insurance companies require quarterly or semi-annual inventory updates, but are we doing it as we should?

It is also true that many of us only think that we are insured. Thinking that a policy that covers household items will also cover the collection. In many cases this is not true. It would be worth a call to your agent, to make sure.

We are not in the insurance business, nor are we recommending any particular actions on your part in this regard. We are merely trying to point out that some considerations of this nature could be an invaluable aid to you in the event of a loss.

Hopefully it will never be needed.

In our never ending study of Cambridge glass, we would like to point out to you a couple of confusing etched patterns.

Shown below are two 12 oz. footed tumblers. They are both from the #3120 stemware line. The etching on one is very simply named Number "732", while the other has the almost regal name of "Majestic".

Upon close examination we find the etching to be the same on both tumblers. The only difference being the cutting that has been added to the one called "Majestic". Note how it has been cut around the top, foot and stem to further enhance its beauty.





Patterns

Caprice.. PART III

What a world of new beauty you'll discover in Caprice, America's most in-vogue glassware pattern. Brilliance, charm -- an exquisite graceful design that bespeaks your infinite good taste for truly gracious living. (From 1930's ad material)

With this article we will vary our tactics somewhat from the previous format. We are providing the information so that you can do some of the work.

We have received many letters from members that have questioned the availability of particular items in specific colors. We do not have all of the answers as yet, but in the material of this article there should be many of them. The Price List included herein represents the peak of the production of Caprice and provides us with color

and shape information on approximately 85 to 90 percent of the pattern items.

To obtain the full benefit available from this list, study all of the information given very carefully. It lists about 215 of the items produced, tells us the colors each was being produced in at that time, which items were grouped as sets, and even describes the Alpine finish applied to the 300 Line stemware.

To use the list most effectively, find the item you are interested in on the catalog pages. The number below the item will be its catalog number and is the number you will use to locate this item in the Price List. The various columns to the right of the description will indicate by the presence of a price the colors available, and whether or not the Alpine finish was used. Bear in mind that we are only talking in terms of 85 to 90% of the production, and that there will be some exceptions.

The following General Information appeared in the front of the Price List and will be applicable not only to this Caprice article, but to any patterns that may in the future be presented from the 1940 Catalog.

TERMS	All accounts are due and payable within 30 days from date of invoice. A discount of 1% will be allowed if paid within 15 days from date of invoice. Accounts are payable at the Company's main office at Cambridge, Ohio, U.S.A. Remittances to be made payable to the order of "The Cambridge Glass Company".
PACKAGES	To be charged at standard prices.
TRANSPORTATION CHARGES	All goods are sold F.O.B. Factory at Cambridge, Ohio.
BREAKAGE	We make NO ALLOWANCE for loss by breakage, as our responsibility ceases after Transportation Company has issued receipt for shipment in good order. Before removing goods from Transportation Company, examine carefully, and if any breakage or damage, have agent of Transportation Company make note on Shipping Receipt so you can file claim. Each package is put up by an experienced packer and the contents carefully checked. If any complaint, do not fail to send us NOTICE SLIP which will be found in top of package, which gives name of packer, checker and the number of pieces contained in the package. NO CLAIM will be entertained unless Notice Slip is returned to us. In opening barrels containing Glassware always remove top hoop first. DO NOT drive head in as much breakage may occur in that way.




We wish John good luck in his many endeavors and look forward to the '77 Convention under his guidance.



PRICES here & there

Our first report this month comes to us from a reporter who has been traveling around the country and has some interesting prices to share with us.

In Virginia, Caprice moonlight blue cups & saucers are selling at \$15 per set and Cambridge Square wines at \$7 each. In Texas, Rosepoint stems sold for \$30 each, and a Rosepoint cocktail shaker sold for \$125, while a Rosepoint Ball jug brought \$150. Two 8" draped lady figure flower holders sold for \$65 and \$75 each (pastel colors), while a 13" pink frosted draped lady brought \$120.

A few "asking" prices seen at some Michigan shows included frosted Scotty bookends at \$100 per pair; Eagle bookends at \$130 a pair. In Virginia, a pair of Rosepoint Hurricane shades with rough bases had a \$125 price tag; and at several Depression Glass shows, moonlight blue Caprice Ball jugs were being offered at \$95 to \$100 each.

According to this reporter, prices seem to be higher in the South and West - and seem to be climbing all over the country!

Another reporter sends us the following prices seen at shows and in shops in Michigan. Again, keep in mind that these are the "asking" prices.

NearCut Feather punch bowl, base and six cups \$65; NearCut pattern? punch bowl, base and eight cups \$65; heatherbloom #3400/91 relish \$47.50; Dianthus pink #119 - D1001 basket \$47.50; crystal Caprice #91 salt and pepper \$5 pair; forest green #1402/52 ice bucket with

chrome hdl. \$45 and 2 oz. cordials with crown tuscan nude stems & mandarin gold bowls at \$42 each.

If we were awarding a prize each month for "BEST BUY OF THE MONTH", it would have to go to the following reporters this month!

They write that at an Ohio Auction they were lucky enough to purchase a pair of Windsor blue (pale blue opaque) nude stem candlesticks for \$32.50! Isn't that just the very luckiest buy you have heard about in awhile?

At the same Auction they also purchased a Rosepoint etched, divided relish for \$15.50; a Rosepoint divided mayonnaise for \$15; a Rosepoint #3400, 80 oz. Ball jug for \$44 and two nude stem banquet goblets with amethyst bowls for \$13 each. Seems like some people have all the luck!

Have a few more we will save until next month. Please let us hear from you. A special THANKS to all who have participated thus far!
