



Photo #1 shows a light emerald green plate, signed with the c in a triangle. Hopefully it will reproduce well enough for you to see the Cherubs in the etching.



The little Nautilus open salt shown in photo #2 is amber in color. The top has been ground and polished.





Photo #3 shows a 4" coaster in Azurite. It has a gold rim decoration.

Approximately 30% of our total membership (from 25 states), attended some portion of the Convention and/or the Antique Show, at some point during the weekend. Many of our members who neglected to send in Advance Registration, were disappointed at not being able to attend our Annual Banquet on Saturday evening. It was regrettable, but the point was reached by the management of the Shenandoah Inn, when "just one more" was impossible to accommodate.



After the Show closed on Friday evening, everyone who was registered attended the Get-Acquainted Party. It only lasted a couple of hours (everyone was pretty tired by then), but in that time, our "resident auctioneer" Willard Kolb managed to extract several hundred dollars from our members as a result of his Mini-Auction. You have to watch that Willard - he'll sell anything he can get his hands on! He sold many pieces of Cambridge glass (all donated) and even a Beer Can (empty of course) brought \$1.75. Of course the prize of the evening was a beautiful covered Pitcher and four matching Tumblers in amber with #704 etching, that went to Jim and Georgeann Hemry from Kansas, for \$102.50.

At the close of the Get Acquainted Party, President Smith introduced Georgeann Hemry, Chairman of the Balloting Committee. Georgeann made the announcement pertaining to the results of the election to the Board of Directors. Newly elected was Joseph Andrejcak, Lakewood, Ohio and re-elected were Don Armbricht, Avon Lake, Ohio and George Hoffman, Newark, Ohio. Congratulations were extended to all three men.

Of very special interest during the weekend was the auctioning of three Paperweights made especially for N.C.C. and donated by Tom Mosser. These lovely paperweights contained the N.C.C. Emblem, were signed, and in the bottom of each was crushed glass of various colors that had been

found in the old Cambridge Glass Company dump and donated to N.C.C. for this purpose. These three paperweights brought a total of \$200 into the Museum Fund and much appreciation is extended to Tom, as well as to Iris Slayton and Paul & Ginny Henderson, from Texas, purchasers. Paperweights exactly like these will never be made again according to Mr. Mosser.

Saturday morning saw well over one hundred of our members up early in order to attend the Continental Breakfast and enjoy the slide presentation and talk on "Cambridge Figurals", presented by Frank Wollenhaupt of Dayton, Ohio. This was an all-new slide presentation and proved to be interesting and educational to all who attended.

Later Saturday afternoon, three additional slide presentations were narrated by Frank, Lynn Welker and Willard Kolb. Topics presented were "Cambridge Candlesticks", "Cambridge Etchings" and "Producing the Lion Bookend". All three sessions were well attended.

Our "Research Room", attended by Charles Upton, was open all weekend during Show hours, and it never seemed to be empty. There were copies of all known books on Cambridge glass (these were available for sale also) and back issues of the CRYSTAL BALL for our members to study at their leisure. Also available was a copy of the 1940 Catalog (most of which has been reprinted in the Welker Reprints and in the CRYSTAL BALL) and the research material that has been collected privately by several of our members. N.C.C. has truly benefited from the efforts of this small group of dedicated members who so freely share this information.

The time arrived for the Saturday evening Banquet, and the banquet room looked absolutely exquisite! Karen Jones of Cambridge, Ohio, and her committee had decorated the tables with Cambridge bowls and candlesticks, and beautiful flowers. It could not have been lovelier. Everyone attending received a table favor of a light blue opaque (closely resembled Cambridge's Windsor Blue color) paperweight made from the old Mt. Vernon ashtray mould, flattened on top, and embossed with the N.C.C. emblem. One was auctioned at the close of the banquet and brought \$20 for the Museum Fund.

Lynn Welker, our Convention Chairman and Banquet Speaker, presented, for the pleasure of those present, a most interesting talk and slide program on "Cambridge Colors". This presentation was very well prepared and researched, and the slides were extremely well done and lovely to look at. Frank Wollenhaupt was given credit for the photography work involved. Lynn's talk included such information as the time frame each color was in production and the items usually found in each color. This information accompanied by a slide of the color proved to be most educational.





# PROJECTS

First of all, we want to thank all of you who participated in the Lion Bookend project. So far we haven't received any adverse replies from anyone who purchased them. However, the sales were not as great as we had anticipated. There are, as of the 20th of July, still 80 Bookends to be sold. We would hope that those of you who purchased only one, would complete your set, or those of you who haven't purchased any, would please consider doing so.

There were 406 Lion Bookends produced. We were confident that these would be sold very quickly with over 1,000 members (245 Lady Leg Bookends were sold with little over 400 members). The Lady Legs are now demanding a premium price, as New members who have purchased the Lion, are now seeking the Lady Legs so that eventually they will have the complete series. This will also hold true for the Lion, when we come out with the next Bookend! We know of a 17 yr. old who withdrew \$150.00 and a 15 yr. old who withdrew \$60.00 to purchase the Lions, as investments, when they heard the price the Lady Legs are now bringing.

When you speak of "Limited Editions", you would have to say that this is about as limited as you can get! True the Lion Bookend is only sold to members, but that member can sell his to anyone he desires. There are over 200,000,000 people in the United States and we would have to say that is pretty limited, since it will never be produced again in amber with "N.C.C. 1978 L.I.G." on it.

This is only looking at it from one investment viewpoint however. The greatest investment is that all monies we realize from projects such as this go directly into the Museum Fund and will greatly shorten the time it takes us to reach our ultimate goal - an N.C.C. Museum!

We also want to thank all of you who donated glass for the "Mini-Auction", held during our Convention, and to all of those who were high bidders. You were great, and it was surely fun, except for the heat. We realized \$504.75 (including the three paperweights), for the Museum Fund. Oh, and we still have five pieces that we didn't auction off, but are planning on doing so at the November Quarterly Meeting.

We have two other projects in mind at the present time. One will be personalized paperweights of the same type that we auctioned. The three that were auctioned are "one-of-a-kind" and no more will be made with the same decorations. Another project that we will be working on is some small item from a Cambridge mould, made by Imperial. We should have more on this next month.

We have several ideas on very small items that our Study Groups may be interested in initiating themselves. They could buy glass for the Museum with the proceeds, or donate it directly to the Museum Fund. One Study Group is already looking into Stationery! Also we have a brochure from a Company that makes "Cloisonne Jewelry" very reasonably,

with any design you desire. Several people asked about prints of the Cambridge Glass factory such as the one we had on the picture board at Convention. We will furnish the negatives if any Study Group is interested in selling them. Let us hear from you if you are interested.


